Plants of the Tropics - Xanthorrhoea johnsonii

Xanthorrhoea johnsonii (Xanthorrhoeaceae) is a locally common member of the iconic Australian grass tree genus. Keith Williams appropriately calls this attractive small tree the "Northern Forest Grasstree". This is the classic grass tree of the northern tropical woodlands, occurring on rocky poor soils from the New South Wales central coast almost to the tip of Cape York. Its of relatively modest size, produceing a trunk to 4 m tall. Occasionally you'll see one that is branched. Other species reported for northern Australia include *X. pumilio*, *X. latifolia*, and the spectacular, but as yet unnamed *Xanthorrhoea* sp. (Cape Bedford M.Gandini AQ601576).

Gardening with Xanthorrhoea

stage in 3-7 years. Good drainage and full sun are essential Lack of drainage combined with too much water can cause crown rot in young plants. Similarly, too much water can cause nutrient toxicity.

Our plants, bought as fully developed but untrunked container plants, are growing well and flowering in an open situation unimproved soils on the Cairns hillslopes. They seem to thrive on neglect, having received no fertiliser and minimal soil preparation.
